# The Finish Line

Columbus' own champ of champs in

the exciting field of motorcycle racing is Dick Klamfoth who has just announced his retirement from active competition at the age of 34. From now on, Dick will devote his energy to running his own motorcycle agency, Klamfoth Cycle Sales on Groveport Pk. "It won't be quite the same," Dick admits, "but I'll still be in touch with the boys."

In the past 15 years, Dick has won 16 national championships. He is the only rider ever to have taken three victories on the old beach course in the 200-mile national road race at Daytona Beach, Fla. He was first across the finish line in 1949, 1951 and 1952.

At Laconia, N.H., he was three-time winner of the national 100-mile road race. He has so many trophies he has trouble finding space for them, marking victories in a wide variety of events, from flat track races to endurance runs.

For a while during his racing career, Dick was a farmer, but now he is devoting full time to the business side of motorcycling.

The cover shows a neatly-controlled drift close to the infield rail, which kept Klamfoth skating faster on his steel-shod left boot on the turns than some of the more spectacular broad-sliders. This shot was taken when Klamfoth was the nation's top half-mile track star. Complete story on page 10.







# Plan Now To Visit Daytona



Action at last year's Daytona Classic.

Each year Daytona has been a big and great event, but each new year it seems to be bigger and greater than before. Time is running out for those who wish to compete as March 10 is the deadline for all entries. However, if you wish to attend this fabulous week of racing, there is still time to make plans and reservations.

Prize money of \$21,600 is the largest purse of any motor-cycle event in the world. This melon will be divided \$12,000 for the 200-mile championship; \$2500 for the 100-mile amateur; \$1500 for the 70-mile novice; \$3500 for the 250cc combined streamlined class; and \$2100 for the two nights of short track.

Several firsts will be recorded during the race events on the International Speedway. Fairings or streamlining will be permitted for the experts in the 200-mile national championship. In addition to the events held in former years there will be a new combined class—250cc streamlined for experts, amateurs, and green plate novice.

All these events plus the Sportsman events should give riders their fair share of racing miles and spectators all the thrills and excitement they can pack into one week race viewing.

For those who wish to start early and stay longer there will be additional events the week end before Daytona and the following week.



# Klamfoth Retires From Racing

# One of All-Time Greats Ends Colorful Career After 15 Active Years

The old time motorcycle racers club, which consists of such past stars as Jim Davis, Leo Anthony, Eddie Kretz, Floyd Emde, Billy Mathews, Bill Tuman, Bobby Hill, and Brad Andres, will have to move over now to make room for another of their clan, Dick Klamfoth.

Klamfoth has announced that he is retiring from all racing. Last week he told that he had thought of retiring after the 1962 Ohio championship, but that he then decided to ride one more national and he went to Lincoln, Ill., for the five mile. It was there that he became involved in an accident while practicing before the race that left him with a badly injured back from which he is now slowly recovering.

He had thought that he might ride some road race events, but after carefully considering the thought he has decided that he would give up all racing for good.

No doubt Klamfoth has been one of the most colorful riders of the past 15 years. From the day he won his first expert race, the 200-mile championship on the four-mile beach and road course at Daytona Beach at the age of 19 in 1949, to his final ride on the day that he said: "It was the first time I was ever trapped and couldn't get away" at Lincoln, Ill. It also was the first time Klamfoth had ever been hospitalized from a racing accident in his entire career.

He said, "Sure I fell off a few times and skinned some arms and legs, but I consider myself as very luck that this was the only bad accident I ever had." Klamfoth wears a brace today, which he will wear for several months, but he is on the road to complete recovery and is active in his business every day.

I was at Daytona when Klamfoth won his 200, in fact I was there in 1948, watching my first motorcycle race, when Klamfoth finished second in the 100-mile amateur on the same course. He was just starting his second year of racing.

Those who watched the "farmer from Groveport" over the years will never forget the smoothness with which he rode in all types of events and how he always seemed to have complete control of the situation at all times.

It was beautiful to watch, especially when he got started back in line, take the riders in front of him one by one in a very methodic style.

Once he took the lead of the race he usually got far enough in front to feel secure and then he only maintained enough speed to hold his spot. It was at times like this when the fans thrilled to his beautiful exhibitions of riding a motorcycle. Only he had the ease and grace that few athletes in any sport seem to attain, placing them above the others.

Klamfoth always rode foreign makes of machines. He said that he always felt his machine was the "underdog" of the race, and in winning events on that machine he believed it added to the thrill of victory.

Klamfoth was also known as a promoter's rider. He was always a drawing card, and promoters wanted him in their races. He never failed to make good copy while around the tracks. Many times he has gone on radio and television to help promoters publicize their events. And never in his long career did he ever fail to say the correct thing when speaking to the fans after winning a race. Along with his riding ability, he had

personality and a very friendly disposition.

Klamfoth, who now lives at 5400 Sims Rd., out of Groveport, and has his "Klamfoth Cycle Sales" on Groveport Rd., is assisted in his business by his wife, Beverly. They have three beautiful blonde daughters, Cheryl, 5; Karen, 4; and Christy, 3.

When he started his career he was accompanied to all events by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Klamfoth, and they too became nearly as widely known as their racing son, they are "Mom" and "Pop" to the motorcycle race followers and will remain in that light.

Klamfoth started his career in 1947 when Jim Smith, the Norton dealer on 17th-Ave., in Columbus, put him on a bike and got him under way as a novice. He rode 10 races that year and then moved to amateur. He was second at Daytona and went on to a fine amateur year to move up to expert.

Dick won the Daytona 200 three times and during his career he stacked up 16 national victories. His biggest years were in 1951 and 1952 when he won four national championship events each year.

Klamfoth says the finest track he ever rode was the one-mile dirt oval at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield, Ill. He said the best half mile in the country is the track at Ohio State Fairgrounds. He liked them both and loved to ride them.

When asked who he thought was his greatest competitor and the finest sport he never hesitated to say "I'll have to give both honors to Bobby Hill. Maybe it was because he and I rode against one another so often, but Hill was great and a pleasure to race against and with."

Bobby Hill, who raced out of Columbus during his whole career was the first rider in the AMA every to carry the figure one on his machine, denoting the title of national champion, for two consecutive years. In 1952 Klamfoth and Hill just about divided the national honors in the country.

Klamfoth said his second greatest competitor was Jimmy Chann. Chann was from Bridgeton, Conn., and made Columbus his home for several years. Then, Klamfoth said, Joe Leonard was next. He called Leonard a great rider who knew all the tricks of the racing sport, whether on flat tracks or road courses.


Klamfoth credits good equipment, good mechanics and the fact that he always rode on the conservative side and never attempted to ride "over his head" for his successful career.

He said he felt the crowd was always with him and feels that he made thousands of friends among them that he will always have. Because he rode his own choice of machine, Klamfoth took pride in his equipment and the work he did on it. He thinks this helped put the fans on his side.


He credited Jim Smith with keeping him enthused enough to keep riding and praised the help he received from BSA and Indian and the help he had from Chuck Minor of Columbus, who was his mechanic for years. Francis Beart of the Norton factory in England gave him the technical knowledge to do his own work.

Klamfoth said when he won the 15-mile at Heidelberg and the 10-mile in Columbus in 1957 and again in 1958, he never thought he would win either race either year. He said he just thought he didn't have the equipment at the time to do it, but everything worked and he was as surprised as anyone else.


Klamfoth thinks there are a lot of good riders coming up. He believes Dave Estep of Columbus, who was top novice and amateur in Ohio for the past two years, will improve his riding as an expert and be good. He also has high hopes for Don Kiger of Lancaster, one of the top novices of the past year. He says that both Kiger (Continued on page 26)









Rain Date has been set for May 12. The Huber Memorial marks the eastern half-mile opener. Make your plans to compete or attend now. Remember that date, April 21st.





# The 1963 Triumphs

S PEARHEADED by the introduction of an entirely new 650cc unit-construction engine U.S. Triumph distributors recently announced a ten-model motorcycle program for 1963 with the introduction of a new fully automatic scooter. Emphasis has been put on "cleanness" of design and substantial engineering improvements are apparent throughout the entire Triumph range.

Prestige model of new line is the T120 Bonneville which is powered by the new engine fitted with a special racing dual carburetor cylinder head. This new model although capable of speeds in excess of 115 mph in standard trim, will idle evenly and carburate smoothly throughout the power range. This is due principally to the introduction of a balance tube between the intake manifolds ensuring even distribution of air-gas mixtures.

Also, all of the new Triumph 650 models are infinitely smoother at all speeds owing to a new factory engine balance factor, the new frame mounting arrangement and the rubber cushioned handlebar mounts.

The new 650 Triumphs retain the same


steering geometry and wheel base which has helped to make these models successful for literally every use be it for the highway or for competition.

All in all there are five 650cc models in the 1963 Triumph line-up — all of them equipped with the new engine. There are two Bonnevilles; one strictly designed for the discerning road rider and another with specifications more to the liking of the competition enthusiast.


In addition there are two 650cc Trophy Sports models — one for the highway and, as with the Bonneville series, one for the sports-competition rider. These models are identical in literally every respect to the Bonneville series except that a single carburetor cylinder head is fitted. The Trophy model is ideal for the rider who requires maximum flexibility of the power range without any serious reduction in performance characteristics.

The Trophy models are both high performance twins in sports trim.


The 650cc Thunderbird is a model designed especially for highway use and affords high speed cruising coupled with unusually long engine life and below

average maintenance requirements.

While fitted with the same new 650 engine which powers the Bonneville and Trophy models, the Thunderbird power plant incorporates 7 to 1 compression and milder camshafts to facilitate ideal road riding characteristics. Also, the Thunderbird is fitted with a four-gallon gas tank to allow for comfortable long distance highway cruising.

Three models in the 500cc class have been introduced for 1963; two sports models and one highway model on the order of the Thunderbird.

The two sports models, the Tiger 100 series, are very nearly identical in that both are fitted with the high performance unit-construction Triumph twin engine. The highway sports model referred to as the T100S/R is equipped with battery ignition and lighting whereas the versatile T100S/C is fitted with A.C. magneto (no battery) and direct lighting.

The latter is an all purpose model with special appeal to those who ride both on and off the highways and for those interested in competition.

The 500cc Speed Twin is the highway model patterned after the Thunderbird in that milder camshafts are fitted in concert with 7 to 1 compression. Performance however is unusually good and the Speed Twin offers the ease of handling, low maintenance characteristics which have long been associated with the famous Speed Twin series.

Two 200cc OHV single cylinder mod-

els form the Triumph lightweight series for 1963. The stout hearted Tiger Cub model T20 is designed primarily for practical transportation and is fitted with an improved unit-construction single cylinder power plant. Its engine incorporates a mild road camshaft in combination with 7 to 1 compression ratio affording owners of 100 miles per gallon of gas with cruising performance of 55 mph easily. Top speed is above 65 mph. The T20 Tiger Cub is fitted with 17" wheels front and rear which provide for easy handling by tall or short riders alike.

The Sports Tiger Cub differs from the standard model in that it is fitted with a high performance version of the successful Tiger Cub engine; larger diameter wheels allow ample ground clearance for competition or off-the-highway use and ensure high speed stability when the model is used for racing; a smaller gas tank and sports fenders round out the appeal of this high performance lightweight.

Adding to its versatility, the Sports Tiger Cub is fitted with A.C. magneto (no battery) and direct lighting making this model ideal for both highway use and off-the-highway fun.

In the scooter division the Triumph Tina offers an impressive combination of assets. It is first of all automatic in that all one must do to operate it is to turn the twist grip throttle to go, and push on the ideally located brake pedal to stop. Both front and rear brakes are fitted.

The centrifugal clutch drive called









# Off To The Fair

At the time, we had just come home from a thoroughly enjoyable cycle trip thru the Colorado Rockies, and I couldn't wait to start pianning next year's trip.

Since I was the "victim" of motorcycling parents and never got to go on vacation with them, we agreed that when our two girls were big enough, they would go with us one year, and stay home the next. It was their "year" to go that coming summer. My folks were worried sick about the girls going on such a long trip, to say nothing about Al's folks and many friends who are not too familiar with this motorcycling game. There never was a doubt in my mind. If the girls got sleepy, we would figure something out! Time somehow has a way of dragging by, and before long, Christmas had come and gone and 1962 was actually here. Evenings, plus many daylight hours were filled with going over the many pages of maps in our Atlas. Jokingly, Al said we wouldn't even need to take maps along, as surely I had them all memorized. There was no question in our minds as to when we should go. It would have to be the two weeks preceding the annual Jackpine Gypsy's tour and rally at Sturgis, South Dakota.

We have only missed this great event once since going there on our honeymoon in 1949. We had planned our trip so we would be back there by Thursday night, August 9th. We had sent to Seattle for ticket and motel reservation information in February and were about ready to send to Expo Lodging for reservaitons when a couple from our club asked if we would mind if they rode along with us. Naturally, we asked them to join us, the more the merrier and now we numbered six, and had quite an age spread - Sandy 12 and Terry 10 to Min and Ray Storm, each just turned 60! They had "motorcycle" friends living in Seattle we could perhaps stay with. Also, Min had a cousin living in Quincey, Washington, and a sister in Hillsboro, Oregon. Weren't we fortunate tho!

As I said before, time has a way of dragging by, and finally it was time to start packing. Well, not quite time, but I was packing anyway. By Friday night, the suitcases were all packed and strapped on the cycles. Alas - something was wrong! They were stacked up too high -2 on my bike - 3 on Al's. Ray happened by about this time, so downtown they went. Lucky for us, the downtown stores stayed open on Friday night. They found just the ticket - large soft plastic Army Surplus bags. This also solved the problem of the girls getting sleepy. All they had to do was lean back on those nice soft bags and snooze a bit. Now, I'm getting ahead of myself.

We left home at 4:10 a.m. Saturday, July 28th. Min and Ray stopped at our house for coffee and rolls and we were at last on the road. 



# Motor Maids

Rusty's Roundup by Rusty Denney

Motor Maids throughout the country are making their plans for another busy and exciting season of motorcycling and there will soon be worlds of news to report on their activities. However, since winter is persisting on continuing in full force in most of the states, this article will continue the story of the Motor Maids.

The officers of the Motor Maids consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Supply Officer, Publicity Officer and Advisory Editors. The Executive Board is comprised of the officers and state directors. Duties of these officers in most respects are the same as officers of most any club or organization with the additional pleasant duty of furthering motorcycling. The President supervises the general affairs of the club and appoints the special committees and state directors. This is much too small a sentence to cover the voluminous duties handled by this office. The Vice-President, as customary, assists the President and has presidential power in the absence of the President.

Records of club activities, reports of meetings and general correspondence are some of the multitude of duties of the Secretary. The Treasurer receives all dues, pays all bills, first approved by the President and Secretary, and makes an annual statement of club funds. The Supply Officer keeps an account for all club owned supplies including shirts, ties, pins, emblems, etc., and holds them for resale to members.

Because of the distance which separates the Motor Maid membership, our quarterly paper is essential. The Advisory Editors edit and prepare this paper which keeps the members posted on activities and events to come. The Publicity Officer prepares all publicity for release to various magazines and motorcycle publications.

The Executive Board has general control of club affairs and all matters are decided by a two-thirds vote.

At the head of each state or district, a State Director is appointed by the President to act as a closer link between officers and members. This appointment is based on a vote by the members of each particular state or district. The duties of State Director are to cover races, meets and tours, meet all members in her state or district and in general to promote interest in the club.

In addition, the Motor Maids have a secret Membership Board consisting of six members appointed each year by the club officers. This is in every sense a secret board, and a member of this board does not even know the identity of the other five members. This Membership Board has the final say on all prospective members in question as well as the final say on the removal of an undesirable member. It has been rare indeed during the 22 years of Motor Maid existence that the Membership Board has been used in this respect, but it has never hesitated to take the swift action necessary to preserve the good name of the Motor Maids should it become necessary.

On a very rare occasion when a member has been guilty of unbecoming conduct, the offending member is usually first warned by one of the officers in order that Membership Board procedures need not be used. And, in order for a warning letter to be sent, it is necessary for the club Secretary to have received at least three complaints concerning the member in question. At the discretion of the Secretary, after investigation and inquiry, the Secretary may ask for a vote of the officers. If the officers agree that a warning letter is necessary, a board letter is sent. A member of the Motor Maids can receive only one warning letter from the Board and should a second become necessary, this again at the discretion of the Secretary and vote of the officers, a vote on this member's status in the club may be taken by the Membership Board.

The investigation by the club is a meticulous and thorough procedure and proof must be conclusive before it is determined that a member is a detriment to the club. Treatment of an offender is very fair inasmuch as eight officers and six board members must vote and voice their opinions prior to a first warning letter, and ample opportunity is afforded the member in question to answer any formal charges against her before a vote for her removal is taken.

The above policies, again, are some of the reasons why the Motor Maids have attained their status and growth through the years. Perhaps the one single thing that keeps the club together is our love for motorcycling. We are not afraid of our rules and regulations and our Membership Board, but have respect for them, our club and ourselves.

No doubt some have been curious about the Motor Maids after having seen some of our groups throughout the country, and it is hoped that these two articles have served to answer some of the questions. The club is continually growing and is always happy to welcome new members for it is a known fact that each new member in our midst loves to ride motorcycles, and that is our primary concern. We welcome all inquiries concerning our club and information can always be obtained by writing our President, Dot Robinson, at 2801 John Lodge, Detroit 1, Michigan.

The annual officers' meeting of the Motor Maids was held January 25th to January 27th in Shreveport, Louisiana, during the worst of the winter's blast to the midwest. Officers in attendance were Dot Robinson, President; Pat Boatright, Vice-President; Butch Widman, Secretary; Nickie Hero, Treasurer; and Mary Cutright, Supply Officer. Pinchhitting for officers not able to attend were volunteer workers, Mable Hutchinson, Margie Yoke and Dot Hill. These girls certainly had to brave the elements by driving through blinding snow and many miles of icv roads in order to handle the business before this meeting. However slow their pace may have been at times, they were well equipped for most any emergency that might result from the sub-zero temperatures. ## Western Views

Things were pretty quiet in the West from the first part of December until the first of February. There were no races along the oval or TT line until just a few weeks ago.

For some unknown reason the TT season for '63 did not open on the first Sunday in January as it has in the past. You guessed it, the first Sunday of the first month was one of the best, if not the best, day that we have had in over a year out this way as far as racing weather is concerned.

At any rate, the season finally got underway on the first Sunday in February in the form of a TT at Ascot. The extra month the riders had to get ready payed off as 48 novice riders, 31 amateurs and 31 experts were on hand.

Much interest centered around the new TT track that was a must due to a new quarter mile being constructed inside the half mile oval. The TT track is just about the same distance as it was before only it will be faster due to some new turns that afford higher speeds. I say "will" be cause it rained for two days prior to the race and the track was soft and mushy in spots which caused a few fall downs along with cutting the potential speeds that will prevail when conditions are normal.

A year ago Dick Dorresteyn won the opener and scored many points, enough to go on and take high point honors. This year he never made it through the first turn of the first lap in the heat before he was out of the running.

Dick led the pack into the turn and then did a header over the bars. The only thing that was hurt was his pride along with a slightly bent machine, but it was enough to cancel him out of the running.

Jack O'Brien, Clark White and Jack Simmons were the three expert heat winners with O'Brien's the fastest heat time of the day. Two new amateurs, Eddie Mulder and Bob Bailey, posted the second and third fastest heat race times with White's the fourth fastest.

The top four made up the dash event with O'Brien shading White with Bailey in third and Mulder fourth.

The expert final found O'Brien in the front at the start with White and Sid Payne close behind. Jack held it all the way to the end of lap 13 before he gave way to the waiting White who scored a record 67 TT wins in '62. O'Brien was second with Payne a close third.

First time expert, Dave Palmer came up late to take a surprising fourth place with Simmons running in fifth.

Twelve experts started the main and all

were around at the finish except Skip Van Leeuwen and Harry Krugh. Both dropped out with mechanical troubles. Eddie Kretz came close to not making it to the finish as he took an endo on the last lapone of the few times that Kretz has ever been off the machine in quite some time. Eddie remounted to get across the line in tenth place.

Eddie Mulder and Bob Bailey completely outclassed the amateur field and ran away from the other ten riders in the 10-lap final. These two ranked one, two in the points as novices last year and looks like they will do the same as amateurs this season. Paul Bostrom, the nation's high point TT novice last year, ran second in the heat before coming back to take third in the final.

Novice side it was all scrambler-hare and hounder, Dusty Coppage. Dusty looks like he is headed for big things as a pro with his easy style of riding. Ascot must seem like a golf course after riding so many desert events.

Coppage blew off the opposition with ease in both the heat and the final. His only competition in the main was Doug Christopher. Doug was one of the top five novice TT riders at Ascot last year until he left for the Army and then set the rest of the season out when he returned so he could get a full season in this year before moving up to amateur.

Many of the readers will remember Christopher if you were at Daytona last year. Doug rode the short track events as a red plate novice and was on an oval for the first time. He made it all the way to the semi where all that remained was eleven expert, mostly national numbers. He missed by a wheel of going to the final.

The next night he hit the wall hard in practice and skinned himself up pretty bad and spent the rest of the time in the motel healing.

#### HAMMER MISSES OPENER:

About the only top rider, other than Dick Mann, who was not around for the TT was Dick Hammer. Dick broke his arm in four places a couple of months ago doing "Wheelies" between races at a scrambles event. He was on his way to a rapid recovery when he broke it again trying to push a car with the weak wing. This will probably keep him out of the March 3rd 100-lap TT and give him just enough time to uncast and get to Daytona.

#### **NEW NATIONAL NUMBERS:**

Three riders showed up with national numbers for the first time. Digger Helm from Bakersfield is now sporting #57. Sid Payne, also from Bakersfield, takes over the old Tom Cates number 32. Ralph White, San Diego, took over #15 when Bates Molyneaux moved down and took over the Johnny Gibson retired #5.

Bob is also going to give the half mile a serious try come April.

Simsbury's Charlie Vincent was at the opener, in the stands. Charlie now calls California home and will be in the thick of it the next time out. Scrambles fans in the New England area will be happy to hear that CV is really starting to tear the boys up in the trophy events and is turning back many of the riders who rank high in the standings. We are expecting big things from this popular rider in the coming events in District 37.

Charlie's wife, Gail, is still somewhat on the homesick side, but it has been pointed out to her that there are more houses in one block where she now lives than there is in the entire town of Simsbury, Conn.

Darrell Dovel, the happy wandering cycle racer, has been spending the winter with race photographer, Walt Mahony. This is the third winter for Darrell who was also in the stands for the TT. He is going to ride the next event and then pull stakes for Daytona.

LOOKING EAST:

California will be well represented in Daytona this year. The majority of the top riders have already entered and are ready to go. Dick Mann, Ralph White and Sid Payne, the three who finished second, third, and fifth last year, will be leading a field that also includes: Al Gunter, Dick Hammer, Skip Van Leeuwen, Clark White and Mert Lawwill in the expert class, to name a few.

The West's amateur hopes will be riding with Dick Newell and Dick Guglielmana. Newell led the amateur chase down there last year only to lose by a matter of yards. Guglielmana, the number one novice dirt track rider in the nation in '62, will be back for the second time. Last year he ran fifth in the sportsman lightweight road races and then returned to Ascot to run away from all of the novices the rest of the year. Another amateur from out this way who shows promise is a possible new name to many—that's Dennis Davidge who ranked in the top

ten at Ascot last season in both the half mile and novice TT standings. Steve Camp, the rider who was the second fastest novice qualifier at Daytona in '62, will also be in Daytona as an amateur. Steve was running in the first five last year when he went out early in the race.

At this time it is not known for sure what riders from out here will be entering the special 250cc road race. Many of the top experts are looking for good small bore jobs, but as yet nothing is definite. THE NEW SEASON:

The next TT at Ascot will be on the first Sunday afternoon in April. This will be a regular three class program. The following night, April 12th, the first half mile race of the year goes at Ascot. From then on it is every Friday night for the oval riders until late in the fall.

Again we would like to extend an open invitation to any and all out-of-state riders to come to Ascot. We will try and make them welcome and hope there will be many who accept.

A total of 30 half miles and 12 TT's are on the card for Ascot with five TT's going this year at Lancaster (The Thrill Show Course).

WESTERN FANS FLYING TO DAYTONA:

This is the last call for any fans on the West Coast to fly to the Daytona races. The plane leaves Los Angeles on Friday night, March 29th and will arrive in Daytona early Saturday morning. Three road races and a short track later the plane will leave (Sunday Night) and be back in Los Angeles early Monday morning. Any out of area fans who are interested should call DAVIS 4-1502 in Gardena, Calif., for full details.





mountains — AND — it was my birthday! From here until we got to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, the scenery is simply too beautiful to describe. 

we headed toward Portland, and along the Columbia River. Oh, I forgot to mention, it was raining again!

We stopped at Multnomah Falls to take pictures and get a hot cup of coffee at the lunch stand. The lady working in the gift shop backed away from us like maybe we had just arrived from Mars. Water was running off our rain suits like water off a duck's back. I told her we didn't have to travel like this, that among us, we left 6 cars sitting at home, one of them air conditioned.
